

## City Map




## TOP SIGHTS

### BASÍLICA DA ESTRELA

The curvaceous, sugar-white dome and twin belfries of Basílica da Estrela are visible from afar. The echoing interior is awash with pink-and-black marble, which creates a kaleidoscopic effect when you gaze up into the cupola. (Praça da Estrela)

### TRAM 28

This rickety, screechy, old-fashioned ride from Praça Martim Moniz to Campo Ourique is 40 minutes of mood-lifting views and absurdly steep climbs. The century-old tram has polished-wood panelling, bee-yellow paint and chrome fittings. (Praça Martim Moniz)



### CASTELO DE SÃO JORGE

Gazing grandly over the city, these restored hilltop fortifications evoke Lisbon's history from the bold to the bloody. The castle dates to the mid-11th century when the Moors ruled the city. Battles, coronations, an earthquake – this castle has seen it all. (www.castelodesaojorge.pt)

### PRAÇA DO COMÉRCIO

Everyone arriving by boat used to disembark here, among the 18th-century arcades and triumphal arch, and it still feels like a thronging gateway. Wander the riverfront, gaze up at the equestrian statue and see the history of Lisbon mapped out in stone. (M Terreiro do Paço)

### MUSEU NACIONAL DE ARTE ANTIGA

Perched above the river, a 17th-century palace holds Lisbon's foremost collection of ancient art. Star pieces are by Albrecht Dürer, Nuno Gonçalves and Gil Vicente. (www.museudearteantiga.pt; Rua das Janelas Verdes)

### IGREJA & MUSEU SÃO ROQUE

The plain facade of 16th-century Jesuit Igreja de São Roque belies its dazzling interior of gold, marble and Florentine azulejos (hand-painted tiles). The museum adjoining the church is packed with elaborate sacred art and holy relics. (www.museu-saoroque.com; Largo Trindade Coelho)

### MUSEU CALOUSTE GULBENKIAN

An epic collection of Egyptian pharaoh reliefs, Persian carpets, 18th-century French silver, Qing porcelain, Dutch Master paintings, impressionist art and exquisite René Lalique jewellery. (www.museu.gulbenkian.pt; Avenida de Berna 45A)

### NÚCLEO ARQUEOLÓGICO DA RUA DOS CORREIROS

Hidden under the Millennium BCP bank building are layers of ruins dating from the Iron Age. Fascinating archaeologist-led tours descend into the depths. The extremely well-done site is now rightfully a National Monument. (Rua Augusta 96)

### ELEVADOR SANTA JUSTA

This wrought-iron structure is the handiwork of Gustave Eiffel's apprentice, Getúlio de Sousa Castilho. Get to the crowds and ziplines for sweeping views of the skyline. (Rua de Santa Justa)

### CONVENTO DE SANTA JUSTA

Soaring ethereally above the city, this 1389 Carmelite convent was almost entirely devoured by the 1755 earthquake. The shattered pillars and arches left exposed contain a capital city's history. (www.conventosantajusta.pt; Rua de Santa Justa)

## LISBON SHORT LIST

### HISTORY BUFFS

**Mosteiro dos Jerónimos (N1)** Founded in 1501 to trumpet Vasco da Gama's discovery of a sea route to India. Jerónimos is now a Unesco World Heritage Site. (www.mosteirojeronimos.pt)

**Igreja de São Domingos (K15)** The Portuguese Inquisition, the 1755 earthquake, raging fire – this enigmatic church bears the scars of its dark past. (www.patriarcado-lisboa.pt)

**Igreja de São Vicente de Fora (P15)** Part of a monastery, this twin-towered Renaissance church shelters royal tombs and displays elaborate *azulejos*. (Largo de São Vicente)

**Teatro Nacional D. Maria II (N17)** Originally intended as a

### BARGAIN HUNTERS

**Sé de Lisboa (M17)** One of Lisbon's icons is the fortress-like Sé de Lisboa, built in 1150 on the site of a mosque soon after Christians recaptured the city from the Moors. (Largo de Sé)

**Miradouro de Santa Catarina (G17)** The views here are fantastic, stretching from the river to the Ponte 25 de Abril and Cristo Rei. (Rua de Santa Catarina)

**Museu do Teatro Romano (N17)** This ultramodern museum catapults you back to Emperor Augustus' rule in Olisipo (Lisbon). The star attraction is a ruined Roman theatre, which recalls out Lisbon's

## GETTING AROUND

### TRANSPORT

#### Tram, Bus & Funicular

**Carris** (www.carris.pt) operates all transport except taxis. Buses and trams run from about 5am or 6am to midnight. A funicular journey costs €3.60, except the Elevador da Santa Justa, which costs €5.

**Metro** Compact and easy to navigate, the **Lisboa Metro** (www.metrolisboa.pt) has just four lines: red, green, yellow, and blue. It runs from 6.30am to 1am.

**Taxi** Taxis in Lisbon are plentiful. Try the ranks at Praça dos Restauradores, near stations and
