


TOP SIGHTS



VIKINGSKIPSHUSET


This museum houses three viking ships, two in impossibly pristine condition. Their dignified, dark presence makes the life of the much mythologised Vikings seem vividly present. (www.khm.uio.no; Huk Aveny 35)

OSLO OPERA HOUSE

Opened in 2013, Oslo's Opera House resembles a glacier floating in the Bjørvika inlet. It is the city's most iconic building, with the walkable roof of a prime selfie-zone and perfect place to view the waterfront from. (www.operoen.no; Kirsten Flagstads plass 1)



EKEBERGPARKEN

Located on Tjuvholmen island, this €90-million, 7000-sq-metre building houses various contemporary art from postwar American to German, to newer artworks by Brazilian, Japanese, Chinese and Indian contemporary artists. (www.afmuseet.no; Strandpromenaden 2)

ASTRUP FEARNLEY MUSEET

Located on Tjuvholmen island, this €90-million, 7000-sq-metre building houses various contemporary art from postwar American to German, to newer artworks by Brazilian, Japanese, Chinese and Indian contemporary artists. (www.afmuseet.no; Strandpromenaden 2)

AKERSHUS FESTNING

This imposing 13th-century fortress is one of the city's most recognisable landmarks and is a wonderful place to imagine the city's early days, take in the view, or browse through one of its fascinating museums. (admission free; Christiania Square)

MUNCHMUSEET

A monographic museum dedicated to Norway's greatest artist, Edward Munch, and housing the largest collection of his work in the world (except for *The Scream* – it's in the Nasjonalgalleriet). (www.munchmuseet.no; Tøyengata 53)


VIGELANDSANLEGGET

Gustav Vigeland is Norway's best-loved sculptor and this collection of his work fills, and utterly transforms, the city's Frognerparken with more than 200 sculptures in granite, bronze and iron. It's worth visiting the nearby Vigeland museum too. (www.vigeland.museum.no/no/vige)

OSLO SHORT LIST

HISTORY BUFFS

Norwegian Maritime Museum (D14) Norway's rich maritime history explored in a beautiful Oslofjord setting. (www.marmuseum.no)

Ibsen Museet (J9) A brilliant insight into the life and work of one of the world's best playwrights. (www.ibsenmuseet.no)

Historisk Museum (L8) Three museums under one roof and home to many fascinating exhibits such as the National Antiques Collection and an Arctic exhibit.

BARGAIN HUNTERS

Rådhus (L10) An architectural landmark with incredible mid-20th-century artworks. It's free to enter and have a look around.

Slottsparken (K8) These stately gardens surrounding the Royal Palace are an attraction in themselves, and free to wander about in.

Parliament Building (M9) One of Europe's more charming parliament buildings is a delight to explore.
