High Season Jul & Aug
Accommodation prices 10% to 20% higher (book ahead if possible). Warmest time of year, but often wet. Midges at their worst in Highlands and islands.

Shoulder Season May, Jun & Sep
Warm sun, clear skies. Wildflowers and rhododendrons bloom in May and June. Statistically, the best chance of dry weather minus midges... June

HIGHLAND COAST & THE ISLANDS

Scotland's southwest coastline harbours some of its most inspiring corners, including majestic Mull, the whisky distilleries of Islay and Oban's sustainable seafood. Wildlife experiences are a highlight. Further north is an epic land with a stark beauty, the home of Scotland's vast and melancholy soul.

SKARA BRAE C2

SHETLAND ISLANDS D1

Close enough to Norway geographically and historically to make nationality an ambiguous concept, the Shetland Islands are Britain's most northerly outpost. It feels uniquely Scottish, though, with deep, naked glens flanked by steep hills, twinkling, sky-blue lochs and, of course, sheep on the roads.
