When to Go

High Season Jul & Aug Weather is at its warmest. Accommodation prices increase in coastal areas and national parks. but not in cities. The absolute peak is the August school holidays. Prices also rise to peak levels over Christmas and New Year.

Shoulder Season Apr-Jun, Sep

The season doesn't kick off until Factor Prices rise to neak levels

ANGLESEY & THE NORTH COAST
